T&T, US pledge further cooperation on security

RELATIONS between Trinidad and Tobago and the United States of America continue to be fostered, as discussions were held this week with representatives of the military arms of both countries.

The Ministry of National Security held a press briefing on Tuesday at Tower C at the International Waterfront Centre in Port of Spain, which was chaired by Minister Edmund Dillon and Admiral Kurt Tidd, Commander, US Southern Command.

Tidd said the two organisations had spent the past two days discussing security issues of mutual concern to the two nations, as well as the region, something which he said could only be "combated" with bilateral and regional cooperation.

"The United States respects and values the significant contribution Trinidad and Tobago makes to stability in the Caribbean and the hemisphere," said Tidd. "We appreciate the opportunity to share perspectives and ideas on effective ways to collaborate against threats of mutual concern and we salute T&T's willingness to address the tough issues, including the challenge of radical extremism.


"Our dialogue and partnership allow us to more effectively address the trans-regional networks that enable criminal and extremist activities. Our partnership also enhances our ability to support humanitarian assistance operations to save lives and ease suffering in the aftermath of disasters" he added

"The US Southern Command is committed to working with Trinidad and Tobago and all of our Caribbean partners, to contribute to lasting peace in the Americas and protect our shared interests, foremost among them the safety and security of our citizens. I have greatly appreciated the opportunity to visit your country, and hear the perspectives of your leaders on the challenges and opportunities we face together."

Dillon expressed similar sentiments, noting that he was very appreciative to have face-to-face discussions with the admiral on the strategies that the two nations could be utilising to combat crime.

"The most fruitful part would be sharing of information, because, at the end of the day, no one country can treat with all of the issues. Building and working with other nations is what will push us forward," Dillon said.
